



UAHT SPRING AND FALL ENROLLMENT INCREASES

The University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana welcomed 1,183 students in the spring semester. This spring enrollment number represents a 10.4% increase from last spring and the largest spring enrollment since 2020.

This fall, 1,307 students attended UAHT. This number represents an increase in fall-to-fall enrollment for three straight years and the college's largest fall enrollment since 2019.

Among the factors for enrollment growth at UAHT include affordability, time to completion, and an increase in dual enrollment high school students.

UAHT COLLEGIATE ACADEMIES LEAD THE STATE IN HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS GRADUATING WITH ASSOCIATE DEGREES AND HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMAS SIMULTANEOUSLY

Two local high schools that partner with the University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana to offer collegiate academies rank number one and two in associate degree producers in Arkansas. According to data released by the Arkansas Department of Education, the top two high schools in Arkansas for students graduating with their high school diploma and Associate of Arts degree simultaneously are Arkansas High School in Texarkana and Hope High School in Hope, Arkansas.

The two high schools partner with the University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana to offer the Hope and Arkansas High Collegiate Academies, which allow students to earn their associate degree and high school diploma at the same time at no cost to the student. For the graduating class of 2024, UAHT was responsible for a remarkable 20.5% of all high school graduates in Arkansas who graduated with an associate degree. "We feel this is one of the best opportunities ever afforded to students in Arkansas," said Dr. Christine Holt, UAHT Chancellor. "The collegiate academies give many students who may not have otherwise had the opportunity the ability to attend college while saving them thousands of dollars in tuition, fees, and other costs. We are thankful for the desire of these school districts to partner with the college to provide this unique and life-changing opportunity to their students. The program is also a testament to our staff and faculty who provide these opportunities and help guide our students to success."

This year, UAHT celebrated the fourth graduating class of the collegiate academies. The class of 2024 consisted of 23 graduates from the Hope Collegiate Academy and 16 from the Arkansas High Collegiate Academy. Since the program's inception, 111 students (75 from Hope High School and 36 from Arkansas High School) have simultaneously graduated with their high school diploma and associate degree. "The Hope School District and the Hope community are proud of the Collegiate Academy students," said Dr. Jonathan Crossley, Hope Public School District Superintendent. "The partnership with UAHT has been a cornerstone of the district's strategic plan. Our

long-term plan has multiple supports built in for HHS students to gain enrollment and, ultimately, an associate's degree from UAHT. This partnership is life-altering and community-affirming. We are so proud of our students!"

With twenty-three graduates from the Hope Collegiate Academy, Hope High School claimed the top spot in the State of Arkansas, with the most high school graduates also graduating with an associate degree. Arkansas High School was close behind in the second spot statewide, graduating sixteen students with a high school diploma and associate degree. "The Texarkana Arkansas School District is proud of the partnership between Arkansas High School and UAHT," said Dr. Lloyd Jackson, Texarkana Arkansas School District Superintendent. "This collaboration offers our students a unique opportunity to get a head start on their college education while providing significant cost savings to families. We are committed to providing our students with the tools and resources to succeed academically and professionally. By fostering a solid foundation through programs such as this, we prepare our students for the challenges of higher education and set them on a path toward long-term success. Our partnership with UAHT is a testament to our dedication to creating opportunities that empower our students and support our community."

The collegiate academies are the only full college immersion programs of their kind in Arkansas, where students take classes full-time on the college campus while still participating in extra-curricular activities on their high school campuses. The academies set students up for success by saving them time and money. On average, collegiate academy graduates save \$19,738 compared to the cost of the first two years at an Arkansas public four-year university. Of the academy graduates who transferred to four-year universities, 100% received scholarships and began at four-year universities taking junior-level courses. Many took advantage of the Arkansas Transfer Achievement Scholarship, which allowed them to attend the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville at UAHT's tuition rate. In addition, 100% of collegiate academy students moved from an ACT 16 to an ACT 19 or higher between 10th and 11th grade. These students are prepared to succeed at a four-year university or the workplace by learning to adapt to the rigor of college courses.

HENRY RECEIVES ARKANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY'S MOST PRESTIGIOUS SCHOLARSHIP

Tara Henry, a 2024 graduate of the Hope Collegiate Academy, was announced as a recipient of the Arkansas State University A-State Scholar Scholarship. The scholarship is an Arkansas State University Honors College Scholarship; only 35 are awarded yearly. To qualify for the scholarship, students must have a minimum 31 ACT Superscore score and a high school minimum GPA of 3.500. The A-State Scholar Award provides up to \$14,000 annually.

Henry said this award gives her an opportunity to pursue higher education in a way she had only dreamed of. "This will significantly aid in my ability to afford college," she said. "I never thought I would be able to achieve something like this, and it feels so rewarding to see all the work I have put in over the years pay off. The instruction and support I received at the collegiate academy helped me immensely in my academic progress to achieve this award."

FIBER OPTIC TECHNICIAN PROGRAM LAUNCHED AT UAHT



UAHT launched a new Fiber Optic Technician program this fall. In partnership with the Arkansas Fiber Academy, the program offers students a unique opportunity to gain handson field experiences, in addition to classroom learning. This practical approach equips students with the knowledge, skills, and abilities that employers look for when hiring fiber optic technicians. These skills include the installation, maintenance, and troubleshooting of fiber broadband to homes and businesses. Upon completion of the program, graduates will be eligible for the Fiber Broadband Association OpTIC Path 3-year certification.

The program consists of nine weeks of evening classes, with new classes beginning approximately every twelve weeks. It is free to eligible students, with the cost paid for by the Office of Skills Development.

UA HOPE-TEXARKANA COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY HELD MAY 14

The 2024 University of Arkansas Hope-Texarkana commencement ceremony was held on Tuesday, May 14, at Hempstead Hall. This year, 413 students graduated (a 15% increase from last year) with 618 degrees and certificates (a 25% increase from last year).



LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR EARNS DIPLOMA AND ASSOCIATE DEGREE FOR FREE, SETTING STAGE FOR FUTURE ENGINEERING CAREER



In 2022, Clay Walraven of Bodcaw, Arkansas, chose to enroll in the Secondary Career and Technical Education Center at UAHT. Clay said he decided to attend the UAHT Secondary Career Center because he was presented with the chance in his junior year of high school to take the free career center classes along with my regular high school classes, and he could not turn down the opportunity. "This was an excellent opportunity to get a feel for how college would be early on," Walraven said. "After my junior year, I greatly enjoyed the classes at UAHT, and I was given the opportunity to take all college-level classes at UAHT during my senior year. I accepted the opportunity without hesitation, and in 2024, I graduated with my high school diploma and Associate of Applied Science Degree in Electromechanical Technology simultaneously."

Clay said he greatly enjoyed his time at UAHT. He found the campus inviting, and all the staff and instructors were kind and helpful. "They were always willing to help and guide me where I needed to go if I ever had a question. The instructors always taught in a professional and efficient manner. They never wasted time and always taught me what I needed

to know. All the instructors were knowledgeable in the subject matter and extremely familiar with all the tools and equipment. The small class sizes significantly increased my learning efficiency and helped ensure that all the students completed the class with the necessary knowledge and skills."

According to Clay, the main reason he was able to take the classes and earn his degree early was due to the UAHT Secondary Career Center, which offers the courses free of charge, and the Nevada School District "Blue Jay University" program that helped him with other classes. "Without them, I would not have had this wonderful opportunity. These great programs help students get a head start in their college education and career." Clay's future goals are to attend Southern Arkansas University to pursue a master's degree in engineering. "The courses I took at UAHT have helped me build a solid foundation for success at SAU and in my future career," he said.

Walraven highly recommends UAHT to high school students and traditional college students. "UAHT is a great place to get started in your college career or train for a good job, whether you're just graduating high school or someone starting many years after high school. UAHT's early college high school programs and affordable tuition rates make it possible to earn a degree without stressing over the potential debt that can come with it. I would also recommend UAHT to others because of the small class sizes. This allows students to gain one-on-one instruction and helps ensure they achieve all the knowledge they need regarding the subject matter."

UAHT MARKETING DEPARTMENT WINS NATIONAL ADVERTISING AWARDS

The UAHT College Relations Department was selected as the winner of six educational advertising awards at




